Cremorne Community Group



Tidelines PROJECT CAMBODIA

Scott and his family of 5 live in, and love Cremorne, having been a resident here for 10 years. After 10 years with various Local Council's as an Environmental Health Officer, Scott has, over the last 11 months, been working and fundraising for "Project Cambodia" and recently travelled to Cambodia for the 'hands on' part of the Project.

The team raised \$20,000 for the Project and each of the 8 participants, then funded their own personal travel costs to Cambodia.

The Project goal was to build a new school, boarding house and residence for the teacher and founder in Poi Pet (on the Thai border) and also a new home in Siem Reap for a family of 7 who have all contracted HIV.

The school and boarding house teach and house children, some from disadvantaged backgrounds and others where parents need to leave for extended periods to work across the border in Thailand.

In addition to the hard labour of clearing the site and preparing the footings for the school, Scott and his team also made time to connect with the local children, teaching them English, playing and even changing the words for Waltzing Matilda and singing that to the children.

Scott describes that the building of the home for the family in Siem Reap had its own particular challenges in terms of space and also the risks surrounding the treatment of injuries in a home where the caring family, particularly the children, wish to tend to your wounds if you became injured.

For the 17 days in Cambodia, Scott says he was taken completely out of his comfort zone; staying in AUD\$7/night accommodation (surprisingly comfortable), making tools to build with, enduring hard labour for hours a day in 30 degree heat.

Scott says that it was a completely humbling experience and that he feels lucky to have such a supportive family that allowed him to use his skills in such a creative and generous way.

Scott describes the Cambodians as a resilient race, full of hope and beautiful people.

The experience has really focused and reminded Scott and his family about the important things in life and reminds all of us how lucky we are to live in this beautiful place which is Cremorne.
